Weekly Activity Report

September 22-26, 2014

President Garrey Carruthers, Ph.D.

- The attendance numbers for the Domenici Conference are in, and it is a new record – 1,032 registered, with 37 percent being students. An outstanding conference with outstanding attendance.
- This is Tough Enough to Wear Pink week, which has become more of an NMSU program, even though we are still interested in working with the Cowboys for Cancer Research in raising money for their endowment. I hope all will wear their pink and show up for the game on Saturday in pink outfits.
- The search process is underway for the Athletic Director position. If you know of interested candidates, they should apply electronically by October 15, at which time the search committee will begin their review.
- Congratulations to Mary O’Connell, this year’s recipient of the Westhafer Award for Research. We had a nice reception for Mary where we also recognized other Westhafer recipients – the crème de la crème of our great University.
- The Council of University Presidents met by telephone to discuss the funding formula. Although not complete, it appears there is an agreement to use the funding formula from last year and tweak it by adding two matrices. One matrix will calculate the value of student credit hours using the Tier table developed in the 1990s (which really needs to be updated). The other matrix will assign various values to degrees. Neither matrix creates a big problem, but they make the formula a little more complicated. As currently constituted, there should be minimal movement among the sectors – research, comprehensive and two year college programs. This is important in that recently money was drifting away from the science universities toward the comprehensives and two-year programs.

Executive Vice President and Provost, Dr. Dan Howard

- On Monday, September 22, I attended the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Career (PARCC) statewide meeting in Albuquerque. The purpose of PARCC is to develop assessment of student learning in math, reading, and writing that is aligned with the common core. The assessment tools are currently under development; once complete, they are intended to provide colleges with reliable information about student readiness for college coursework. Also, beginning in the 2015-2016 school year, students will need to pass the PARCC assessment in order to receive a certified high school diploma in New Mexico. As I noted in my questions of presenters at the meeting, I am concerned that the assessment exams will be in place and required of students before longitudinal studies have validated the exams. While I am supportive of efforts to provide colleges and universities with more reliable information about student readiness for college coursework, I am concerned by the rush to implement assessments without proper validation.
- The Student Success Best Practices Summit attracted more than 100 faculty and staff members who listened to presenters from most of our colleges discuss innovative initiatives implemented within their colleges that are designed to enhance student success. There is much good work being done within our colleges to help students with developmental courses, to intervene aggressively when

students show signs of faltering, and to improve readiness for demanding coursework. To learn more about these initiatives and others (e.g., prescriptive advising, degree pathways, and peer mentoring) go to the Provost's Webpage and view the webcast.

- On Thursday, September 25, I attended a Legislative Finance Committee meeting in Santa Fe, where the formula funding for higher education was discussed. The proposed formula for the coming year is more complicated than the formula for the previous year and some legislators were concerned about loss of funding for community colleges and lack of stability in the formula. As Senator Papen noted, it is difficult for universities and colleges to plan when the formula changes annually. Work on the formula is likely to continue over the course of the next few months.

Dean, College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Dr. Lowell Catlett

Agricultural Experiment Station

- Fabian Garcia Gardens hosted the Ag Leadership group which consists of CEO's, company presidents, news media, and various other community leaders, and some ACES employees for lunch, and tours of the gardens and research plots. Sodexo served plated food items including NMSU Shrimp tacos. After lunch the group went over the shrimp production facility and learned of all the wonderful products that are being developed from glandless cotton seed. Glandless cotton seed is being researched at the Agricultural Experiment Station and is



being used for baked goods, meals, flours, oils and many other products including aquaculture feed. Participants got to see firsthand aquaculture production of pacific white salt water shrimp being grown in a zero water exchange system. The group learned how the Agricultural Experiment Station is addressing various issues that growers and community residents are facing. The Fabian Garcia Botanical gardens is located on University Street. It is open to the public from sun up to sundown. Media Productions


- Learning Games Lab is expanding NMSU's statewide mobile technology outreach. They equipped Extension agents at the Albuquerque State Fair with specialized iPad systems to help judge and track state fair animals. Media Productions also created a new mobile app, called Livestock Record, to help 4-H'ers monitor animal weight, feed, health, income, expenses and assets on their iPhones or iPads. The National 4-H Council is now promoting NMSU's new app to 4-H'ers across the nation.

Michael A. Morehead, Dean

- Dean Morehead discussed advancement plans with Kelley Coffeen and Ashley Jurado. The discussion included expanding our reach into El Paso and building relationships with our graduates in that area. The discussion also included future plans for the Cornerstone award and the Board of Advocates.
- Following up on that discussion we met with Kay Brilliant to plan for the reorganization of the Board of Advocates. This process will be conducted in two phases; in the fall meeting we will seek input from the board members related to roles and responsibilities. In the spring meeting, an overall plan with three or four primary objectives and responsibilities outlined for board members will be determined.

- Dr. Morehead attended the university wide event on student success and heard several good presentations on student retention and actions taken by the various colleges to improve student retention.

- Met with Adelina and Ashley – clarified details on STARS event, started working on Homecoming.

Dean, College of Engineering, Dr. Ricardo Jacquez

- The College of Engineering and the Engineer's Council presented Spin Your Own Web, a full-day workshop to help students prepare for the career fair. Professional engineering career consultant and speaker Alaina Levine presented interactive discussions on preparing and attending an interview, appropriate dress code, maximizing the career fair experience and exploring passions and realizing potential. Some 36 engineering students attended the event.
- Company representatives and alumni from Cummins Inc., ChevronPhillips Chemical and Sandia National Laboratories volunteered their time and expertise and reviewed more than 200 resumes for engineering students over the course of a two-day Resumania. The event was sponsored by the College of Engineering to help students prepare for Career Expo.
- Nearly 80 employers visited the NMSU campus for Career Expo on engineering and technology day, jointly hosted by the College of Engineering and Career Services. An estimated 1,000 students attended the engineering day of Career Expo.
- The College of Engineering hosted 11 employer Information Sessions for students to learn about the respective companies and employment opportunities. Some 271 students attended sessions presented




Cummins, Fast Enterprise, Freeport McMoRan, NAVAIR, Kimley-Horn, Raytheon, Schlumberger, DCP Midstream, Sandia National Laboratories, General Motors and Chevron Phillips.

- Twenty-one engineering students participated in the first-ever College of Engineering's Aggie Engineering Design Contest sponsored by Intel Corp. Intel challenged students to develop a product that was fun, novel and marketable using Intel's Galileo boards. Students were given basic kits and had three weeks to develop their products, beginning with a training session on Galileo boards, followed by weekly question and answer sessions with Intel engineers. Competitors used the Aggie Innovation Space Presented by Intel to develop their designs. Mechanical engineers Gregory Taylor, Jesse Wilkinson and Colt Cappuro won the competition with their design Not-So Blinded that allowed automated blinds to track sunlight and allow ambient light into a room. Using the Galileo board as processor, solar panels track the position of the sun to close and open the blinds accordingly. Wilkinson explained that in the future, they would like to allow for manual adjustment, a battery back-up system and integration with other household appliances.
- Nearly 70 people participated in Stanford's Epicenter and Pathways to Innovation Program workshops, learning ways to incorporate innovation and entrepreneurship in undergraduate engineering classrooms and engage teams of faculty and university leaders to stimulate a culture of innovation on their campuses. The workshops were hosted by the College of Engineering and were attended by faculty, staff, students and representatives from universities throughout the nation who are participating in the Pathways program. The program culminated with an Aggie Innovation Challenge, with 45 students in teams creating their own low-resolution product prototypes. The NMSU College of Engineering is a participant in the Pathways to Innovation Program, managed by the National Center for Engineering Pathways to Innovation (Epicenter). Epicenter is funded by the National Science Foundation and directed by Stanford University and VentureWell (formerly NCIIA).

Interim Dean, College of Health and Social Services, Dr. Donna Wagner

- Joe Tomaka, Associate Dean for Research, met with Clinical Outreach Sub-Committee of the CHSS Advisory Board (Ann DeBooy, Sabrina Martin and Jennifer Cervantes) where they discussed the results of our "Continuing Education Needs Assessment Survey" that is distributed to leaders at local health and social service agencies with professionals requiring CE. Results indicated needs in several areas. The next steps are (a) to conduct a follow up survey of specific needs in those areas and (b) use those results to organize a CHSS-sponsored CE opportunities in the spring semester.
- In addition, Dr. Tomaka is nearing completion of NIH grant application to examine the effectiveness of our innovative Coping-Enhanced PNF intervention for reducing college drinking and related problems. Submission deadline is October 5.
- Dr. Blair of the School of Social Work, had two papers accepted at an international conference on health psychology. The conference will be held in Havana, Cuba, from November 10 through 14. His papers are titled, "Developing an Optimistic Explanatory Style", and "The Use of Logotherapy with Suicidal Adolescents".
- Also from the School of Social Work, Dr. Tina Hancock hired a new faculty member. Ann Mosely, College Associate Professor, will serve as the content expert on their new SBIRT grant (\$850,000) for the next three years. The purpose of the grant is to integrate evidence based content on substance abuse prevention and intervention into the curricula of social work, nursing, counseling, education and psychology. The P.I. on the grant will be Dr. Hancock.
- Letty Gallegos, Academic Advisor for the Department of Public Health Sciences, coordinated a webinar titled, "Handling Difficult and Disruptive Behaviors" on September 23. The webinar focused on how to handle students in many different situations, and advice regarding how to manage



emotional faculty, staff and students who approach front office staff members in a disrespectful manner. The presenters were Dr. Brian Van Brunt, former President of the American College Counseling Association and Julia Johnson, Assistant Coordinator of Testing Services at Western Kentucky University. Over 40 people from across campus attended the webinar.

- Dr. Joe Gladstone from the Department of Public Health will be participating as a speaker in the Tribal Wisdom for Business Ethics conference, organized by Professor Grace Ann Rosile in the College of Business. Dr. Gladstone will be discussing the intersection of American Indian tribal values and organizational management. The Tribal Wisdom Ethics conference is sponsored but the NMSU Daniels Fund Ethics Initiative.
- The School of Nursing presented a proposal for the NMSU Alamogordo nursing program to the Board of Education on Friday, September 26.

Dean, Honors College, Dr. Miriam Chaiken

- I met with four individuals who are interested in applying for the position of Associate Dean in the Honors College. They wanted more information on the responsibilities for the position and the goals and direction for the College in the years to come.
- I participated in the first meeting of the search committee for the Associate Dean position and we discussed the procedures for the search, as well as the qualifications that would be ideal for the Associate Dean.
- I began engaging in some of the groundwork for the search process for the Dean of the College of Education (Provost Howard asked me to chair that search). I worked with Yoli Baca in the Provost's office to have a call sent out across campus, especially in the departments in the College of Education, to invite interested individuals to submit their name as potential participants on the search committee. There will be an election to select search committee members in a couple weeks. I reviewed about 20 job announcements in the Chronicle of Higher Education for posts in Colleges of Education. I contacted HR and was able to obtain the current job description for Dean Morehead. I scheduled a meeting with Dean Morehead to discuss how he views his current role. All of this information will be used to craft a job announcement that will reflect the complexities and opportunities in this position.
- I had a lunch for two members of our advocacy group, the Circle for Excellence. I will be meeting all the members of the Circle in small groups in the next few weeks in advance of our first formal meeting since I became Dean, now scheduled for early November.
- I was very pleased to be recognized at a luncheon sponsored by the Teaching Academy to recognize the Outstanding Mentor. It was a lovely event, and I was very moved that my mentee, Kassia Wosick, nominated me for this honor.
- I learned that the Honors College has not traditionally mentored students as they decide whether to apply for graduate studies, nor helped them learn how to prepare competitive applications for graduate school. I designed a workshop on graduate school applications and professionalism and invited students to join us on Friday afternoon. Dr. Andersen, our Associate Dean, joined me in leading this workshop, and we had about 25 very engaged and lively students participate in this event. I anticipate teaching this workshop on a regular basis so that students get support and guidance in preparing for graduate studies.



Dean, University Library, Dr. Elizabeth Titus

- Held an all library staff meeting celebrating the accomplishments of library staff in meeting or making progress on 2014-2015 Library Strategic Targets.
- Met with the C. Boyse and L. Miller, co-chairs of the Library Task Force on Future Systems to review and discuss goals, objectives, and timetables.
- Met with all library budget committee to review and discuss current campus-wide budget reductions process and recommendations being forwarded by NMSU Library for one-time 1 percent, 3 percent, and 5 percent targets.
- Attended a library-wide staff training session on Title IX and Sexual Violence.

Sangu Angadi, a crop stress physiologist at NMSU's Agricultural Science Center at Clovis, is leading the study of the crop in Clovis, along with Sultan Begna, agricultural research scientist. Research on canola also is being done at the university's Agricultural Science Center at Farmington under the direction of Agronomy Professor Michael "Mick" O'Neill and Curtis Owen, agricultural research assistant.

Director/Secretary New Mexico Department of Agriculture, Jeff M. Witte

- NMDA staff is working on the final details for the Rounder's Award ceremony for this year, which takes place October 6th in Santa Fe.
- Staff is preparing events and promotions for the Eastern New Mexico State Fair in Roswell September 29 through October 4. The items NMDA is working on include the Country Store and local food activities; October 3: watermelon bust and on October 4: New Mexico's state vegetables, chile, and beans.
- During the New Mexico State Fair, I presented the 2014 Farm Family of the Year Award to the Woelber family of H.A.W. Farms, a dairy farm located in Belen.
- The final Organic Integrated Pest Management Farm walk of the season took place on September 24 at the Farside Farm in Medanales. Twenty-six producers discussed organic management of insect pests and learned about the solar-powered pumps that help irrigate the farm. This concludes the fifth season of organic IPM farm walks.



Chief, NMSU Police, Stephen Lopez

- The Police Department is still struggling to catch up after the UNM vs. NMSU football game. There were 31 individuals arrested at the game, and all initial processing was done that night. However, all of the case entries, work with the courts, and follow-up investigations related to these are still underway. It is expected that this will continue to affect the department for at least another week.
- The Police Department has prepared the Annual Safety and Security Bulletins required by the federal Clery Act for the Las Cruces campus, DACC Central Campus, the Albuquerque Center, and the Santa Fe campus. Because of the many changes required by the Violence Against Women Act, as well as a lack of guidance from the US Department of Education, this has taken a large amount of time from all levels of the department, and has dominated time from the Command Staff for the past two weeks. The report will be released to the campus community the afternoon of September 30 (the deadline imposed by the law). Once that is complete, the information on the crime statistics then has to be re-entered into an online database to meet the reporting requirements to the US Department of Education, with a deadline of October 15, 2014.
- Bicycle thefts continue to be a problem at NMSU, with most of the bicycles stolen using low-quality locks.
